Atopic Dermatitis

Atopic dermatitis (AD), also called eczema, is a chronic, inflammatory skin disease characterized by unrelenting itch that can severely affect quality of life¹

Atopic Dermatitis Affects

~18-25 million people in the U.S.²

- ~90% of cases are mild or moderate³
- **~85%** of cases present by the age of 5 years³ **8%** to **18%** of all infants and children in the U.S.²

Effects on Quality of Life¹

Itch and discomfort affect sleep



Sleep loss decreases school & work performance



Scratching often leads to secondary infections



Treatment

Topical corticosteroids are considered the mainstay of treatment for mild to moderate AD. However, caregivers have significant concerns with treating children because of the risk for skin atrophy and other cutaneous adverse effects.⁵

No topical treatment is available for patients with mild to moderate AD that has both superior efficacy and safety and permits long-term use.⁶
